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Course Learning Goals:

Psychopathology is the scientific study of psychological disorders. This course will provide you with an overview of the field of psychopathology, including diagnosis, etiology, treatment, and research. By the end of the course, you will have an understanding of the major diagnostic categories of psychopathology, theoretical perspectives that help to explain and to direct treatment of psychopathology, treatment modalities, and an understanding of the research base underlying the field. It is also hoped that through this exploration of psychopathology that you will begin to appreciate the complex interplay of factors that affect human behavior.

Reading Assignments:

Reading assignments from the text are listed on the calendar on the last pages of the syllabus. The readings should be completed before the listed class, as we will be discussing the readings on the dates listed. You are responsible for and will be quizzed on the material in the reading and the lecture. Even if material is not explicitly covered in lecture, you will be responsible for it on quizzes. Make sure you read the material carefully.

Group Assignments:

1. Case study draft [50 points]. You will be asked to work with another student of your choosing to identify a disorder of interest and complete a case study assignment. I can assign you to a group if desired. You will select a case [i.e., a real person with a disorder] from course materials (e.g., cases in your textbook(s), documentary or video clips from class) or from your own research (e.g., web site, news story, memoir). You will be asked to write a paper summarizing details about the case as well as research related to a particular topic of interest that is relevant to the diagnosis. See calendar below and/ or CANVAS for due dates. A grading rubric will be posted on CANVAS.

2. Case study final version [100 points]. You will use feedback to edit your case study write-up. Please see the calendar below and/ or CANVAS for due dates. A grading rubric will be provided on CANVAS.

3. Case study poster presentation [100 points]. You will use your case study research and write-up to create a poster presentation related to the disorder and case you selected. Your group will present your poster during an in-class conference/ presentation day. This is a professional presentation. Please dress professionally in business casual attire, and be prepared to present your poster and answer questions. You will be rated by selected peer reviewers and myself, and these ratings will factor into your grade for this assignment. A grading rubric will be provided on CANVAS.

Individual Assignments:

- Class Participation [80 points]. On weeks when there are no mid-term quizzes, there will be a class participation exercise(s). In order to receive participation points, you must be present and complete the assignment. Please note that assignments will be submitted when they are completed in class. No make-ups will be given for these assignments. I will drop one assignment per student.
- Mid-Term Quizzes [100 points each. 400 points total]. There will be 4 quizzes throughout the semester and each will be worth 100 points. Make-up quizzes will be administered only in documented cases of medical, mental health, or family emergencies. Please submit documentation from your dean's office if you must miss a quiz.
- Optional Final Exam [100 points]. Students who would like an additional opportunity to demonstrate mastery of course material will be invited to take an optional comprehensive final exam that will be similar to mid-term quizzes and administered on the scheduled final exam date. Students who opt to take the final exam will have these additional points added to the points total required (e.g., total points will be 730 versus 830). The final exam score will only be included in the points total if it improves a student's final grade.

- For up to 10 points of extra credit, students can read and complete discussion questions for two chapters in the *Case Studies in Abnormal Psychology* text. Please see due dates in the calendar below. To earn the maximum amount of points, responses should be clear and well-written. Ideas should be expressed in complete sentences.
- For up to 2 points of extra credit on each mid-term quiz, students can complete assignments in LearnSmart for all chapters covered on the quiz by the due date before the quiz.
