COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Psychology from a social history perspective, focusing on models explaining human behavior at both group and individual levels.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- To demonstrate an understanding of how world events helped shape psychology's history
- To be able to describe how limitations and empirical findings led to theoretical developments and shifts
- To describe how other disciplines such as philosophy and biology shaped psychology's history
- -To consider what some of the next big questions in psychology might be
- -To develop your writing skills

Writing Requirement: This course satisfies the College of Arts and Sciences second writing requirement for students who have already completed 60 credits of course work. Therefore, this course will involve writing, receiving feedback on, and resubmitting at least 3,000 words of original text (approximately 12 double-spaced pages) throughout the semester. You will satisfy this requirement by completing 3 papers.

Grades:

Grades for individual assessments will be assigned on a criterion-basis.

The instructor will not calculate your grades until the end of the semester, unless specifically asked to do so by a university office. Exams:

Exam content will include both information from the text and any supplemental information presented in class.

Assignments:

First Drafts: For each writing assignment, you will submit a first draft. This should be your best effort on the writing topic. You will be graded based on spelling/grammar, writing style, and content. More specific information about grading can be found on the rubrics and writing assignment instructions.

Peer Edits: You will be in a group with several other students. For each writing assignment you will have the responsibility of editing for spelling/grammar, style, or content. You will receive a grade for your editing efforts.

Final Drafts: After receiving peer and instructor feedback, you will submit a final draft, making any necessary changes to improve your paper. The grade on your final paper will again be based on spelling/grammar, writing style, and content.

Presentation: At the end of the semester, you will give an approximately 10-minute presentation on the individual that you researched for your final, Diversity, paper. The information that is presented on these days will be included on your final exam.
